Pastor Luther's Article: April 28, 2022

This coming Sunday, we will have an abbreviated (though joyful!) worship service, so as to allow time for an hour-long congregational conversation entitled "Why Us?" This exercise is a crucial part of our transition team's efforts to discern what our collective hopes and dreams are for Holy Trinity as we move toward calling a new pastor.

As you will remember, earlier in the year, the Transition Team asked everyone in the congregation to answer three simple questions: (1) What brought you here? (2) What makes Holy Trinity right for you? and (3) What will keep you coming back? Last Sunday, at church, we distributed the collated (and slightly edited) responses we received. Pastor Luther's Article: May 5, 2022

This coming Sunday is often called "Good Shepherd Sunday" because our gospel text on the fourth Sunday of Eastertide is always drawn from the tenth chapter of John's gospel where Jesus assures his disciples that he is (then, now, and always) our Good Shepherd. On this Sunday we also always hear the Twenty-Third Psalm, that most beloved of psalms.

Psalm 23 is, of course, frequently associated with funerals, no doubt because of its profound promise that "yea, though I walk through the valley of death, I will fear no evil, for thou art with me." Because of its power, the psalm has been set to music in many memorable ways, including the hymn, The King of Love My Shepherd Is, which we will sing as our "Hymn of the Day" this Sunday.



There is, however, another beautiful musical paraphrase of the psalm that is near and dear to the hearts of Episcopalians, and that is Isaac Watts' hymn, My Shepherd Will Supply My Need. That particular hymn was unforgettably seared into my consciousness when I heard it sung some two decades ago at the National Prayer Service in Washington, D.C., following the September 11, 2001 tragedy. When the nation gathered on September 14th in Washington's National Cathedral to mourn, and cry, and pray, what moved our hearts was not the presence of all the living American Presidents and other dignitaries; nor Billy Graham's sermon; nor the eloquent prayers said by the bishops, deans, and other clergy gathered that day. Rather the moment that rendered everyone speechless was when the little boy and girl choristers of the Cathedral took to the chancel steps, and sung Isaac Watt's gorgeous anthem in their pure and innocent voices.

I can't promise that we will sing Isaac Watts' hymn this well on Sunday, but it will be among our communion hymns.

I hope to see you on Sunday, my second to last service with you. I wish I could stay longer!

The Church Council and the Worship Team have been working hard to plan a summer worship experience that will be enriching and enlightening. One of the realities of 2022 is that "supply" pastors are currently in short "supply." Pastor Luther's last Sunday with us May 15, so our "summer"




season will start on May 22. The plan that the Lord has been guiding us to includes a rich variety of familiar and not-so-familiar worship experiences. We will continue summer Sunday worship at 9:30 every week. There will be traditional services lead by clergy we know and those whom we don't know. Some Sundays the traditional sermon will be presented by a guest, some of whom we know, some who are new to us. The guest speakers will present a variety of topics: theological perspectives, outreach locally and outreach in distant lands, Christian living, and other pertinent topics. A schedule will be published as dates are established. Summer plans also include some other traditional events. The semi-annual meeting is scheduled for June 12, followed by the church picnic. Vacation Bible School will be held in a format similar to last year on 4 Wednesdays midsummer. Please plan to join your Holy Trinity family and friends at these events.

Meanwhile, the Call Committee and the MSP (Ministry Site Profile) Team are getting ready to prepare the document that will be sent to the Synod to attract pastoral candidates to our church. On May 22, we will hold a workshop to begin writing our MSP document. Please plan to attend worship on May 15 to bid Pastor Luther farewell and thank him for his leadership during these past months. His presence has been a blessing to us. Please continue to pray for God's guidance as we move through these next steps in the transition process.

Proposed New Constitution Draft for Congregational Review

Toward the end of 2021, we undertook a review and revision of our Constitution. At the end of November, a task force led by Russ Hilliard and Mark Beliveau completed revisions to the constitution reflecting changes that are required by the New England Synod of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America. Additional changes to the proposed constitution reflect current ways in which we do business, such as allowing for electronic voting. The proposed constitution has been reviewed and approved by the Council, and will be reviewed and voted on by the congregation at the semiannual meeting on June 12.

Two documents are available for you to access and review prior to the meeting. One is a brief memo prepared by Russ briefly describing changes that you will find in the second document which is the proposed constitution. Copies are available in the Church Office.
