Announcements

Mark Donahue will be out of the office and away on vacation from today until Tuesday, July 5. He will return to the office on Wednesday.

Today, we welcome The Rev. Edward Voosen to our congregation as our Supply Pastor. Pastor Voosen was here in the 1980's for the installation of then-Pastor, Rev. Frank Hanrahan. Pastor Ed was born and raised in New York City, where he attended Brooklyn Technical H.S. and Pratt Institute. He received his undergraduate degree from Wagner College and his Master of Divinity from Princeton Seminary and New York Theological Seminary. He was approved for ordination by the Lutheran Church in America in 1971 and his first parish was in Brooklyn, NY. In 1974 he was called to Bethel Lutheran Church in Auburn, Massachusetts, where he served as pastor until his retirement in 2010. As a youth Ed studied guitar and at the age of 14 he became a member of the Musicians Union (local 802) in New York City. He performed on the Steel Pier in Atlantic City, and the Hotels Concord, Pierre, Waldorf-Astoria and Grossingers resort. "The Capitols", the band in which he played, appeared twice on the CBS nation-wide "Ted Mack Amateur" Hour. Ed belonged to a Folk Singing trio, and made numerous appearances at folk clubs in the NY area. Throughout college and seminary he taught guitar lessons to work his way through school and also started playing banjo. From 1969 to 1974 Ed founded and directed the "Pinecrest Folk Choir", touring 10 times throughout the Eastern USA and recording two albums. His gift for music has been a major benefit in his service of the Lord. They have 3 children: Ingerlene, Liesl and Paul, and 6 grandchildren, Bernie, Ewan, Marika, Soren, Toby and Valena. Together Pastor Ed & Ruth perform concerts of folk songs, show tunes and comedy songs. They have led campfires and sing-alongs at Camp Calumet, Freedom, New Hampshire, for many years. They love to travel and have organized and led trips to Israel, to the Oberammergau Passion Play, and to other countries in Europe, especially in Scandinavia and Germany where the Lutheran branch of the Church has its roots. Pastor Ed served for 21 years as the Secretary of the New England Synod – an elected position he held from 1987 to 2008 when he retired from the office. He served on the Synod Council, Synod Executive Committee, the Board of Directors for the Region 7 Archives, and Synod Assembly Planning Committee. He served as the Synod Assembly Registrar from 1982 until 2009. Pastor Ed's first opportunity to serve as chaplain on a cruise ship was in 1998, and since then he has enjoyed many more chaplaincies on a wide variety of cruise itineraries.

⁶Those who are taught the word must share in all good things with their teacher.]

⁷Do not be deceived; God is not mocked, for you reap whatever you sow. ⁸If you sow to your own flesh, you will reap corruption from the flesh; but if you sow to the Spirit, you will reap eternal life from the Spirit. ⁹So let us not grow weary in doing what is right, for we will reap at harvest time, if we do not give up. ¹⁰So then, whenever we have an opportunity, let us work for the good of all, and especially for those of the family of faith.

¹¹See what large letters I make when I am writing in my own hand! ¹²It is those who want to make a good showing in the flesh that try to compel you to be circumcised—only that they may not be persecuted for the cross of Christ. ¹³Even the circumcised do not themselves obey the law, but they want you to be circumcised so that they may boast about your flesh. ¹⁴May I never boast of anything except the cross of our Lord Jesus Christ, by which the world has been crucified to me, and I to the world. ¹⁵For neither circumcision nor uncircumcision is anything; but a new creation is everything! ¹⁶As for those who will follow this rule—peace be upon them, and mercy, and upon the Israel of God.

¹After this the Lord appointed seventy others and sent them on ahead of him in pairs to every town and place where he himself intended to go. ²He said to them, "The harvest is plentiful, but the laborers are few; therefore ask the Lord of the harvest to send out laborers into his harvest. ³Go on your way. See, I am sending you out like lambs into the midst of wolves. ⁴Carry no purse, no bag, no sandals; and greet no one on the road. ⁵Whatever house you enter, first say, 'Peace to this house!' ⁶And if anyone is there who shares in peace, your peace will rest on that person; but if not, it will return to you. ¬Remain in the same house, eating and drinking whatever they provide, for the laborer deserves to be paid. Do not move about from house to house. ³Whenever you enter a town and its people welcome you, eat what is set before you; ¬cure the sick who are there, and say to them, 'The kingdom of God has come near to you.' ¹0But whenever you enter a

town and they do not welcome you, go out into its streets and say, ¹¹'Even the dust of your town that clings to our feet, we wipe off in protest against you. Yet know this: the kingdom of God has come near.'"

¹⁶"Whoever listens to you listens to me, and whoever rejects you rejects me, and whoever rejects me rejects the one who sent me."

¹⁷The seventy returned with joy, saying, "Lord, in your name even the demons submit to us!" ¹⁸He said to them, "I watched Satan fall from heaven like a flash of lightning. ¹⁹See, I have given you authority to tread on snakes and scorpions, and over all the power of the enemy; and nothing will hurt you. ²⁰Nevertheless, do not rejoice at this, that the spirits submit to you, but rejoice that your names are written in heaven."

The Celebration of Holy Communion



You will receive a wafer (gluten free wafers are available). Next you may take a pre-filled glass of wine. Please put the glass in the basket by the baptismal font or the lectern. Pre-filled Communion Cups are still available for anyone uncomfortable coming forward to the altar. If you would like to receive communion from the Pastor, but you are unable to come forward, please ask someone to talk to the ushers and we will bring communion to you.

Preface

P: It is indeed right, our duty and our joy, that we should at all times and in all places give thanks and praise to you, almighty and merciful God, through our Savior Jesus Christ. Fulfilling the promise of the resurrection, you pour out the fire of your Spirit, uniting in one body people of every nation and tongue. And so, with Mary Magdalene and Peter and all the witnesses of the resurrection, with earth and sea and all their creatures, and with angels and archangels, cherubim and seraphim, we praise your name and join their unending hymn:



Thanksgiving at the Table

P: Blessed are you, O God of the universe. Your mercy is everlasting and your faithfulness endures from age to age.

Praise to you for creating the heavens and the earth. Praise to you for saving the earth from the waters of the flood. Praise to you for bringing the Israelites safely through the sea. Praise to you for leading your people through the wilderness to the land of milk and honey.

Praise to you for the words and deeds of Jesus, your anointed one. Praise to you for the death and resurrection of Christ.

Praise to you for your Spirit poured out on all nations.

In the night in which he was betrayed, our Lord Jesus took bread, and gave thanks; broke it, and gave it to his disciples, saying: Take and eat; this is my body, given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me.

Again, after supper, he took the cup, gave thanks, and gave it for all to drink, saying: This cup is the new covenant in my blood, shed for you and all people for the forgiveness of sin. Do this for the remembrance of me.

With this bread and cup, we remember our Lord's Passover from death to life as we proclaim the mystery of faith:

- C: Christ has died. Christ is risen. Christ will come again.
- P: O God of resurrection and new life: Pour out your Holy Spirit on us and on these gifts of bread and wine. Bless this feast. Grace our table with your presence.
- C: Come, Holy Spirit.
- P: Reveal yourself to us in the breaking of the bread. Raise us up as the body of Christ for the world. Breathe new life into us. Send us forth, burning with justice, peace, and love.
- C: Come, Holy Spirit.
- P: With your holy ones of all times and places, with the earth and all its creatures, with sun and moon and stars, we praise you, O God, blessed and holy Trinity, now and forever.
- C: Amen.





Now the Green Blade Rises


