Call Committee Update: December 11, 2022

Thank you for faithfully praying for the Call Committee every week. Now would be a good time for a quick update.

About a month and a half ago we were provided by the NE Synod with the resume of a candidate that the Synod felt matched our needs. The Call Committee interviewed the candidate and we agreed that it looked like a good match. We then started reviewing the candidate's qualifications, sermons and items written by the candidate. As we were getting ready to conduct a follow-up interview, we got word that the candidate had accepted a call to another congregation.



We get one resume at a time from the NE Synod to evaluate. However, any candidate can interview in any and all synods across the country at the same time, and apparently, that's what happened.

So we are back to square one. We're hoping to get another recommendation from our Synod of a candidate that is a good match with HTELC, but we're told it won't happen until next month at the earliest. An issue we are facing is that there are many more churches currently looking for pastors than there are pastors available.

This gives us more opportunity to appreciate Pastor Luther, who has been a fantastic interim Pastor. Keep praying that God sends the right candidate to us and we will wait on Him for that to happen.

Pastor Luther's Article: December 1, 2022

Dear Friends in Christ,

It can be a challenge to maintain hope in a world as dark as ours, as we witness the tragic war in Ukraine drag on, watch innocent people across America continue to fall victim to our national love affair with guns, and remember that some countries have been plagued by violent conflict for a very long time (e.g., Afghanistan, Yemen, Mali, Haiti, Myanmar, Venezuela, Honduras, to name a few). Where is the good news in all this, I want to ask myself?

And yet, when I start to feel such despair overtake me, I remind myself that the Christian faith was born into a world every bit as violent as ours. Indeed, in an important respect the whole point of the Incarnation, of God coming into our world, was precisely to confront humanity's violent ways so that we might be saved from ourselves. And the fact of the matter is that God did not allow the darkness to extinguish the light then, and He will not now. This is the conviction of

Advent.

This theological truth is beautifully captured by the writer Madeleine L'Engle in her poem "First Coming." I always go back to it during the season of Advent and I commend it to your prayers.

He did not wait till the world was ready, till men and nations were at peace. He came when the Heavens were unsteady, and prisoners cried out for release.

He did not wait for the perfect time. He came when the need was deep and great.

He dined with sinners in all their grime, turned water into wine.

He did not wait till hearts were pure. In joy he came to a tarnished world of sin and doubt. To a world like ours, of anguished shame he came, and his Light would not go out.

He came to a world which did not mesh, to heal its tangles, shield its scorn. In the mystery of the Word made Flesh the Maker of the stars was born.

We cannot wait till the world is sane to raise our songs with joyful voice, for to share our grief, to touch our pain, He came with Love: Rejoice! Rejoice!

Social Ministry Team Report

The Social Ministry Team has entered the busiest "crunch time" of the year. During October we heard from speakers representing four of the local ministries that HTELC financially supports. The month ended with an off-site group activity, preparing the Operation Blessing Warming Station for cold weather use. In just one hour ten volunteers vacuumed, cleaned, set up beds and repaired Covid-required plexiglass barriers, in preparation for when the nighttime temperatures drop below 20F.



Thanks to the generosity of our members, there were 157 items on the tree. (Some items are obviously pairs!) Mittens: 21, Gloves 47, Hat and mitten sets 2, Hat and scarf sets 2, Scarves 10, Socks 25 and Hats 50. These items will be delivered this week.

HTELC donated generously to Operation Blessing's Thanksgiving Basket. The final tally amounted to 197 pounds of food items in addition to the gift cards to Hannaford's and Market Basket. The Mitten Tree was heavily decorated in the Narthex. 157 items were collected and will be distributed this week. Toys for Tots is in full swing. Toys will be collected Sunday for delivery to the USMC. With the resumption of in-person dining, Dover Friendly Kitchen continues to serve our neighbors with a hot meal and fellowship. The SM Team would also like to thank those HTELC members who have chosen to continue their generous monetary donations. We will soon be announcing which ministries will be receiving additional disbursements from our church.
