

The Desert of Compassion, a Lenten Book Discussion: For Lent, Holy Trinity is invited to read a new book by Pastor Rachel Srubas entitled The Desert of Compassion: Devotions for the Lenten Journey. The book is organized so that for each day of Lent, from Ash Wednesday all the way to Holy Saturday, there is a short Scripture reading, a reflection, and a prayer. After church on Sundays during Lent starting March 12, those who are interested can join Pastor Luther for a discussion of each week's entries as we make our way through the book. We are sold out of all copies of the book, but you are welcome to purchase them on Amazon.

Lutheran World Relief: During this past week, the world has watched in horror at the loss of life and devastation resulting from the earthquake in Turkey and Syria. It is hard to fathom the staggering numbers of people who have died in the rubble. For those who escaped death, living from day to day is seemingly impossible. The search for water, food, shelter, medicines, and warm clothing is daunting. How can we help? Members of the Lutheran World Relief Humanitarian Action Team have been deployed to Turkey to support response operations. LWR is airlifting urgently needed supplies such as thermal blankets and tents, first aid kits, heating stoves, quilts, baby care kits and personal care kits. LWR will expand their response as they secure additional funding. At out meeting on Tuesday, the Congregation Council voted to send \$5000 from our savings to support LWR earthquake relief efforts. In addition, you can help by making a personal financial contribution to LWR to support relief efforts. Information is available at the LWR website (lwr.org). Thank you for your generosity.

What: "Big Hunger Challenges, Bold Generous Response": A knowledge-raising and fundraising initiative for ELCA World Hunger. The goal is to raise \$100,000 collectively as a Synod to be matched by an incredible challenge gift of \$100,000!

When: The Lenten and Easter Seasons (February 22, 2023, through May 28, 2023)

Where: Your New England Synod congregation!

Why: As members of the ELCA, our faith calls us to respond to the more than 820 million people in our world who are hungry. Gifts to ELCA World Hunger allow for incredible work to continue both nationally and internationally. From microloans to community meals, water wells and support for farmers, gifts to ELCA World Hunger make it possible for the ELCA to respond, supporting sustainable solutions that both directly address hunger and get at the root causes of poverty.

Currently, we are seeing global hunger at unprecedented levels, the largest in modern history. The lack of grain coming from Ukraine combined with the largest drought in Africa in 40 years and the economic consequences of COVID-19 means the time is now to pray, participate, and provide.

Details: Throughout the Lenten and Easter Seasons (Ash Wednesday through Pentecost), congregations throughout the New England Synod are encouraged to share the work and witness of ELCA World Hunger. The NE Hunger Team is inviting all congregations to participate however they would like, but we will provide resources such as a Lenten Study Guide, World Hunger resources, fundraising ideas, etc.

We also invite all congregations to participate in New England Synod Hunger Sunday on April 30. We will provide sermon starters, worship ideas, ELCA World Hunger resources, music suggestions, and more. More information to come.

All gifts sent to the Synod with the designation ELCA World Hunger will be matched up to \$100,000! That's a possible \$200,000 that our New England Synod can raise to help combat hunger and support the ministry of ELCA World Hunger! Please note: we are asking all congregations to send their funds through the Synod rather than directly to ELCA World Hunger so that we can have an accurate account of the money raised.

L: A reading from Romans 4:1-5, 13-17

¹What then are we to say was gained by Abraham, our ancestor according to the flesh? ²For if Abraham was justified by works, he has something to boast about, but not before God. ³For what does the scripture say? "Abraham believed God, and it was reckoned to him as righteousness." ⁴Now to one who works, wages are not reckoned as a gift but as something due. ⁵But to one who without works trusts him who justifies the ungodly, such faith is reckoned as righteousness.

¹³For the promise that he would inherit the world did not come to Abraham or to his descendants through the law but through the righteousness of faith. ¹⁴If it is the adherents of the law who are to be the heirs, faith is null and the promise is void. ¹⁵For the law brings wrath; but where there is no law, neither is there violation.

¹⁶For this reason it depends on faith, in order that the promise may Holy Trinity Evangelical Lutheran Church 3 rest on grace and be guaranteed to all his descendants, not only to the adherents of the law but also to those who share the faith of Abraham (for he is the father of all of us, 17 as it is written, "I have made you the father of many nations")—in the presence of the God in whom he believed, who gives life to the dead and calls into existence the things that do not exist.



¹Now there was a Pharisee named Nicodemus, a leader of the Jews. ²He came to Jesus by night and said to him, "Rabbi, we know that you are a teacher who has come from God; for no one can do these signs that you do apart from the presence of God." ³Jesus answered him, "Very truly, I tell you, no one can see the kingdom of God without being born from above." ⁴Nicodemus said to him, "How can anyone be born after having grown old? Can one enter a second time into the mother's womb and be born?" ⁵Jesus answered, "Very truly, I tell you, no one can enter the kingdom of God without being born of water and Spirit. ⁶What is born of the flesh is flesh, and what is born of the Spirit is spirit. ⁷Do not be astonished that I said to you, 'You must be born from above.' ⁸The wind blows where it chooses, and you hear the sound of it, but you do not know where it comes from or where it goes. So it is with everyone who is born of the Spirit." ⁹Nicodemus said to him, "How can these things be?" ¹⁰Jesus answered him, "Are you a teacher of Israel, and yet you do not understand these things?

¹¹"Very truly, I tell you, we speak of what we know and testify to what we have seen; yet you do not receive our testimony. ¹²If I have told you about earthly things and you do not believe, how can you believe if I tell you about heavenly things? ¹³No one has ascended into heaven except the one who descended from heaven, the Son of Man. ¹⁴And just as Moses lifted up the serpent in the wilderness, so must the Son of Man be lifted up, ¹⁵that whoever believes in him may have eternal life.

¹⁶"For God so loved the world that he gave his only Son, so that everyone who believes in him may not perish but may have eternal life.

¹⁷"Indeed, God did not send the Son into the world to condemn the world, but in order that the world might be saved through him."

The Celebration of Holy Communion



Pre-filled Communion Cups are still available for anyone uncomfortable coming forward to the altar. If you would like to receive communion from the Pastor, but you are unable to come forward, please ask someone to talk to the ushers and we will bring communion to you.
